Can you talk a little about your background, because you have been a part of some interesting work

I spent six years in the Army as a Flight Engineer in a transportation company. We flew the Sikorsky CH-37 & Sky Hook.

I have always found myself in some type of competition. In High School it was football and rodeo. In the Army it was martial arts. Afterwards its was various running events.

I attended Washburn University, Topeka, Kansas, receiving a degree in Accounting, and University of Southern California Graduate School, Business Economics.

My first career was 19 years with the railroad and then I completely switched professions, (which was a scary thing) and got into the oil business. Mainly working as a contract manager and project manager among other things.

I traveled the world working in the oil/natural gas business, spending years abroad in places like Argentina, Brazil, and Ecuador. I even lived in Jakarta, Indonesia for a time.

What motivated you to join Masonry?

My Grandfather was a Mason and I admired him very much. That being said, I didn't join for a long time. Joining the lodge was always on my mind but I didn't commit until after I retired because I was always on the move.



Do you have any important Masonic influences?

I have a lot of close friendships with the brothers. One that stands out is Aaron Collier. We became fast friends after I became a Master Mason and we traveled everywhere together. He is really a Mason's Mason. He, along with Nick Nelms and I spent a lot of time on the road together. During my DDGM year, we only missed 2 meetings all year in District 44.





What made you want to stay a member? What kept bringing you back?

You see a lot of brothers that develop a love for Masonry and then time goes by, they get disenfranchised or miss a few meetings and then it is easier to miss a few more and before you know it, their zeal wears thin. We stop coming sometimes for work and family reasons and that is okay. I was fortunate to be at a place in my life that I was able to serve and still do.

I am bought in to the needs of the lodge and the brothers enough that I've always tried to stay active.

The biggest factor in staying active is the long lasting friendships. Those are formed from working together and traveling to Masonic events. All of us brothers counting on each other.

What are some of the most important lessons you have learned over the course of your Masonic Career?

Never give up, persistence will always pay off. You won't always get along with every brother but you have to work with them. None of what we do happens properly on your own.

Some people say that they have had difficult or stressful experiences, but they have learned important lessons from them. Can you give some examples that apply to what you have learned?

In leadership, there is a lot of them. You are going to have stress. When it happens, it is a test of your character and you just have to make the best of it and do what is right. But it is tough serving in leadership sometimes.

Do you have any advice for new Masons?

Get your work done in a timely manner, Don't drag it out. Make time to meet with your instructor more often than the minimum once a week. If you do, you will be much happier and less stressed.

What are your thoughts on retaining members and bringing members back?

A good thing would be a telephone committee. Maintaining and reestablishing verbal communication is key. A newsletter alone just won't do it. Personal contact, I don't see a lot of guys coming back otherwise.





What makes a peaceful and harmonious lodge?

When you learn to accept the vote of the lodge. Some brothers just can't do that and they move on.

What would you say you know now about living a happy and successful life that you didn't know when you were twenty?

That's a really tough one. Maybe focus on the things you know you can change and accomplish them first.

Likewise, if you get into a situation where there is no other choice but a bad one, accept it and do your best.

I have a plaque at home that reads: "You never know how strong you are until being strong is the only choice you have."



Masonry will always be a part of my life. When it is time for me to go into an assisted care home, my plan is to join the Masonic Retirement home in Arlington, Texas.

Then by the grace of the Grand Architect, I will still be proudly wearing the white leather apron of a Mason when I enter the Celestial Lodge above.
