


GRAHAM LODGE NO. 20 A.F.& A.M.



At dawn on March 6, 1836,

On The Topic of.. Lodge Committees & Other Things

(op-ed) FROM INTERVIEWS WITH A WHOLE BUNCH OF BROTHERS.

Brethren,

If you are still reading after the headline, thank you.

I know that the quickest way to exit a conversation is to bring up committees, however they are a vital part of what makes a lodge work, and that's not just me talking. We have spoken to multiple Past Masters of successful lodges and asked for their thoughts on how to avoid contention especially during periods of growth. All agree, that it is important to carefully reflect on how we as a lodge can best work and best agree. Strong Gavel is First. Brotherly Love is next and a big part of that is organizing work properly.







Masonry is Experiencing Growth

We are busy and all hands on deck are needed. But how do we manage growth and still keep those stated meetings to a manageable length of time. All organizations have struggles and ours (chartered in 1845) has had its share. But no brother I have ever heard of joined the lodge to cause trouble, so how does it happen?

I purposely leave you with more questions than answers today, but one thing is for sure, the diversity of talent within Masonic Lodges is vast, we have brothers from all walks of life and most of them want to participate in one way or another.

After asking around, most Masons agree that the worst thing we can do is have a brother leave because he cannot find a way to get plugged-in to the lodge. The second is forcing someone into a job or role that they are ill-suited for.

Build a Committee without Creating a Clique

Friendships naturally form around things that people have in common. People often feel supported and welcomed because of their similar interests. Its natural to do this. We are brothers and want to stay that way, below is the definition of a clique from the world of business.

Cliques

- Make it clear to outsiders that not just anyone can join and be part of their group.
- Often focus on maintaining their popularity or status.
- Accomplish status by making those on the outside feel like they are less important than those inside the clique.
- Notorious for using their perceived power as a way to hurt or bully others.
- Often exclude, ostracize and leave out others on purpose.
- Mean. And this meanness isn't always limited to those on the outside.

Are we as Masons diametrically opposed to all of the above points? Should we hold ourselves and our brothers accountable if we are guilty of such actions? If so, what is the proper method to do so?

How do I as a Mason avoid cliques? Is a Committee the same thing?

Pro's and Cons

"We don't need a meeting for that, we've been doing it for years without it and never had any problems" -Guy in every lodge.

Two issues with the above statement.

First, what happens when that one person in which everything runs through, passes to the celestial lodge above, or is one day unable to perform the duty?

Secondly, have there really been **NO** issues? Are you a servant leader as in one who leads by example? Do you enable those you work with to grow and shine or are you controlling everything to honor yourself? Are you placing "your way" above the good of the craft?

Perhaps the worst thing in the world that could happen to me personally, would to find out that people have been afraid to address my behavior (which has hurt the lodge) because they are scared I might react poorly or even quit. This is a brother that is loved but not liked.

Here are a few observations, again from the business world.

When Committees Work

- 1. Written Committee Description.
- 2. An Effective Committee Chair
- 3. Effective Members Appointed
- 4. Accountability to the Central Organization
- 5. Well-run Meetings (concise)
- 6. Good Food (Jezisek added that one)

When Committees Don't Work

Committees don't work well when there is:

- 1. Lack of long-term agenda.
- 2. Reliance on bad information.
- 3. Inability to focus on the right issues.
- 4, Poor involvement by one or more members.
- 5. Lack of clear purpose.
- 6. Guys don't show up (see 1-5)

What the PM's Say

A while ago, we started requiring officers of the lodge to be on specific committees during their year. This accomplished a few things, first it ensured that at least one person would take charge and that aspect would be addressed. Secondly, by the time you reach the East, you have at some level, participated in every aspect of the lodge.

While not intentional, this method may also make brothers decide if they are cut out for additional responsibility.

To start, decide as a lodge to be really good at something. Ritual, Greeting, Fundraisers, whatever you decide. Start there and that will get the ball rolling before you try to do too much and end up not very good at any of it - PM,

- How do we deal with the person who tries to run everything, or someone who is rude and disrespectful, but we still really care about him?

Response From the PM's

My year in the East, we had a brother that shouted out negative comments in lodge, stirred up mess outside, and was generally not very nice. I learned to gavel him down in lodge, but more effective was just going over the top in showering him with praise. Calling him out by name and thanking him for pointing out all of our flaws and defects. He sorta stopped after that.

Another brother responded...

We had a brother who was on the surface level an effective leader. But as time went on, it became evident that all things in the lodge were to go through him. He had built up quite a faction for himself and became a de-facto king-maker. He was also on every committee including building and finance. Problem being, if he did not like you, then you were never going to a chair and were excluded from most things to do with lodge.

This all came to a head when the Senior Warden went to him in private and said, next year you will not chair any committees and will behave yourself. The Brother who was chided subsequently quit, which is sad but we experienced unprecedented growth afterwards.

Another response..

A public rebuke is not the first step. Being in leadership is having those tough conversations first, man to man, then with brothers, and only as a last resort bringing everyone in.

What are your takeaways from this discussion? Please use this to start conversations in your lodge. If we stop talking to each other we start dying.
